ABOUT AMERICANS FOR PROSPERITY'S

TAXPAYER SCORECARD

AFP's Taxpayer Scorecard is our good faith effort to inform citizens about the performance of their elected representatives. There is no better barometer by which to measure lawmakers' allegiance to fiscal responsibility and economic freedom than to evaluate their votes on key fiscal legislation. Simply put, their votes are their record.

Of course, no legislative scorecard can take into consideration every bill affecting taxpayers. Each of Americans for Prosperity-Tennessee's (AFP-TN) legislative priorities is included on this scorecard, as well as any additional issues we communicated support for during the regular session and special session.

TAXPAYER SCORECARD GRADING OVERVIEW

Each legislator is scored based on the number of votes they took. Key votes are weighted (columns 1-7) more heavily, with a one point deduction for every vote against the key vote legislation. We also award two points for prime sponsorship and

one point for co-sponsorship of key vote items. Any sponsorship of a bill will count as a vote in favor of the legislation, if the member does not have the opportunity to vote on the item.

Stopping Medicaid expansion was a top legislative priority, therefore votes and sponsorship of bills to expand Obamacare are double-weighted. Each attempt to expand Medicaid with Obamacare resulted in the following deductions: -3 points (primary sponsor) and -2 points (co-sponsor). Sponsorship attempts denoted with an exponent.

✗ VOTES AGAINST TAXPAYERS | AFP POSITION: NO

VOTE 1InsureTN Obamacare Expansion** | HJR 7001, 90, 521, 531, HB 1018, HB 2545; SJR 7001, 93, 94, 105, SB 2422, SB 0885 Result: Defeated in Committee

Sponsors: Sen. Overbey / Rep. McCormick, multiple others
Attempts to expand Medicaid utilizing Obamacare funding. A special session was called in 2015 to expand Obamacare with Insure Tennessee.
The Senate Health committee voted the legislation down. Multiple attempts were made to expand this failing program.

VOTE 2**Hall Tax Cut & Repeal | SB 0047 / HB 0831 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 1064

Sponsors: Sen. Green / Rep. Sargent

The only tax on income in our state is going to be cut from 6% to 5% this year. Last minute efforts by Reps. Spivey & Pody resulted in a full repeal effective 2022.

VOTE 3** Education Savings Accounts (ESA) for special needs students SB 0027 / HB 0138 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 431

Sponsors: Sen. Gresham / Rep. Moody

This bill gives parents of special needs students the option to choose which schools and services best meet their child's needs. It is the first school-choice pilot project in our state.

Vote 4** Right to Try | SB 0811 / HB 0143 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 376

Sponsors: Sen. Green / Rep. Lundberg

This bill allows terminally ill patients to opt to receive experimental treatments that have completed phase I of clinical trials, but have not yet been approved by the FDA.

VOTE 5** Paycheck Protection | SB 1707 & SB 151 / HB 294 & HB 2229 Result: Passed Senate; Failed in House EDU committees

Sponsors Sen. Gardenhire / Sen. Gresham / Rep. Spivey
Some automatic paycheck dues deductions are being funneled out
of state and used for partisan political activity, violating state law and
being used against the wishes of many union members. Members
who wished to maintain the deductions could set it up through the
organization or their bank account. Using taxpayer's time and money
to collect union dues is not a role of government. Sponsorship of the
bill is counted as a yes vote.

VOTE 6** Deannexation | SB 775 / HB 0779 | Result: Passed House / Failed in Senate State & Local Committee

Sponsors: Sen. Watson / Rep. Carter

The legislature ended the practice of forced annexation two years ago. A few cities rushed to continue forced annexation before the law went into effect. This bill would have allowed areas forcibly annexed the opportunity to vote in a referendum to deannex if certain thresholds were met. The bill passed the House limited to five cities. The Senate sent the bill back to committee where it was killed. Senate votes to send the bill back to committee and the final committee votes are counted.

VOTE 7** The Right to Earn a Living Act: Occupational Licensing Reforms | SB 2469 / HB 2201 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 1053

Sponsors: Sen. Green / Rep. Daniel

Many occupations in TN have expensive and overly burdensome licensure requirements, serving no purpose other than to stifle competition. The government operations committee will complete a review of each licensing entities' requirements. Federal mandates, health, welfare, safety, and less burdensome options will be taken into account. The government operations committee has the ability to suspend the licensing entity's rule making authority if they do not comply with recommendations to reduce or remove these barriers to employment.

VOTE 8 Repeal and Replace Common Core | SB 1163 / HB 1035 Result: Enacted Public Chapter 423

Sponsors: Sen. Bell / Rep. Spivey

This legislation set up the process to review and replace Common Core education standards with Tennessee State Education Standards. Also required the state board of education to cancel any agreements concerning Common Core.

VOTE 9 Civil Asset Forfeiture Transparency | SB 2144/HB 2176; SB 2029/HB 1772 | Result: Enacted Public Chapters 861 & 784

Sponsors: Sen. Green / Rep. T. Hill

PC 861 - Requires transparency reporting for all civil asset seizures Sponsors Sen. Briggs / Rep. Zachary

PC 784 - Requires a judge, not an appointed officer, to issue the forfeiture warrants

VOTE 10 Prevailing Wage Clarification SB 330/HB 226 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 68

Sponsors: Sen. Johnson / Rep. Doss

As a Right to Work state, Tennessee is not under the union prevailing wage requirements for road projects unless the project is funded with federal dollars.

VOTE 11 Public Contracts | SB 1621/HB 1674 Result: Enacted Public Chapter 587

Sponsors: Sen. Johnson / Rep. Marsh

This bill requires that, when 50% or more of a local government construction project is paid for with state funds, the local government cannot place a preference on local contractors in choosing

a contractor to complete the project. Local contractor preferences are proven to increase construction costs.

Vote 12 Little Hatch Act | SB 0183/HB 1674 Result: Enacted Public Chapter 239

Sponsors: Sen. Hensley / Rep. Casada

As enacted, prohibits certain campaign-related activities by public school employees while on school property during school hours.

VOTE 13 Stormwater Regulations | SB 1830/HB 1892 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 1007

Sponsors: Sen. Southerland / Rep. Halford

Prohibits the state, cities, and any entity from imposing additional stormwater requirements that exceed federal law requirements.

VOTE 14 Direct Primary Care | SB 2443/HB 2323 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 996

Sponsors: Sen. Roberts / Rep. Kumar

This bill allows direct primary care agreements with physicians to be exempt from insurance regulations, giving patients more options on how to pay for their primary care.

VOTE 15 Certificate of Need Reforms | SB 1842/HB 1730 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 1043

Sponsors: Sen. Gardenhire / Rep. C. Sexton

This bill eliminates the Certificate of Need requirement for hospital expansions, increasing the licensed number of hospital beds by up to 10% every three years. The market should determine the need for a hospital and services. The government certainly shouldn't be putting up even more barriers to access healthcare. This is a step in the right direction.

VOTE 16 Textbook Reporting | SB 1842/HB 429 Result: Enacted Public Chapter 165

Sponsors: Sen. Beavers / Rep. Goins

Prohibits supervisors from disciplining or discouraging teachers for reporting inaccuracies, errors, or potentially inflammatory material in textbooks to supervisors, elected officials, or parents or guardians.

VOTE 17 School Choice / Vouchers | SB 0999/HB 1049 | Result: Passed Senate | No Full House Vote

Sponsors: Sen. Gardenhire / Rep. Dunn

The Tennessee Choice & Opportunity Act would have allowed students attending failing schools the option of a voucher to attend the school of their choice. The program would be limited to economically disadvantaged kids stuck in a failing school. It passed in the Senate but, did not have the votes for a full vote in the House. Representatives who voted NO in committee or co-sponsored the bill are scored accordingly.

VOTE 18 Individualized Education Accounts | SB 1735/HB 156 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 620

Sponsors: Sen. Gresham / Rep. Moody

Allows any student attending a TN school for the first time to be eligible for an IEA if they meet other requirements. Under the previous law a student was not eligible until they had attended a TN public school. This clarification helps parents seeking to use education savings accounts for special needs children.

VOTE 19 Professional Privilege Tax Repeal Study | SB 0556/ HB 0678 | Result: Enacted Public Chapter 1024

Sponsors: Sen. Bowling / Rep. Van Huss

Certain professions are required to pay the \$400 privilege tax annually. This bill started as a full phase-out & repeal but, was amended down to a study on how to best repeal the tax.
