History has shown us that a market free from burdensome regulation, taxation and the stranglehold of union bosses will help fuel our economic engines—creating jobs for workers and raising everyone's standard of living.

Michigan's comeback from its lost decade is a case in point. Beginning in 2011, policymakers embraced transformational policies that included workplace freedom, tax and regulatory reforms, and more responsible state spending.

KEY VOTE HOUSE SUMMARIES

2015 House RC Vote #26 Sponsor: Rep. Lauwers

HB 4122 - *End Film Subsidies* - Repeals Michigan's film subsidy program that gives tax dollars to film producers. More than \$500 million in film subsidies have been handed out since the program began in 2008.

2015 House RC Vote #217 Sponsor: Rep. Garcia

HB 4226 - Expand Tech. Subsidies – Increases the number of areas in which "certified technology parks" are allowed to expand. These zones use tax increment financing to provide subsidies to technology-based businesses

2015 House RC Vote #208 Sponsor: Rep. Runestad

HB 4458 - Complete Streets - Eliminates a government-mandated complete streets advisory council (oftentimes stacked with sidewalk interests) that was part of a 2010 law mandating local government master plans incorporate planning to accommodate pedestrians, automobiles, bicycles, etc.

2015 House RC Vote #487 Sponsor: Sen. Schuitmaker

SB 616 - *Pyramid* - Creates a tax carve-out from the state sales tax for business equipment purchases made by an Internet data center. While the carve out was originally aimed at one business, it was expanded as a carveout to businesses within this niche sector.

2015 House RC Vote #27 Sponsor: Rep. Nesbitt

HB 4162 - End Lift Restrictions - Pares back requirements on residential lift installers, requiring certification and insurance in lieu of a burdensome licensing requirements placed on other elevator contractors. This bill would expand the number of contractors who can install residential chairlifts and platform lifts for the elderly and disabled.

2015 House RC Vote #261 Sponsor: Rep. Kelly

HB 4637 - Uber/Lyft - Pre-empt local bans on Uber/Lyft rideshare services.

2015 House RC Vote #38 Sponsor: Rep. Forlini

HB 4038 - Eviction Notice by Email - Allows landords and tenants to negotiate leases that provide for eviction notices via email (the first of many steps toward eviction).

2016 House RC Vote #401 Sponsor: Rep. Cole

HB 5613 - No Stricter than Federal - Curbs state departments from establishing regulatory rules that are more strict than federal rules unless specifically authorized by statute or if the department director determines "a clear and convincing need to do so."

2015 House RC Vote #249 Sponsor: Rep. Poleski

HB 4052 - Preempt Wage Ordinances - Prevents local governments (which derive their power from the state constitution) from imposing mandatory wage, benefit, leave time, and other requirements on employers that are more burdensome than those required by state or federal law.

2015 House RC Vote #306 Sponsor: Sen. Hansen

SB 64 - Nursing Home Regs - Repeals some of the detailed regulations on nursing homes, instead requiring that patient care policies, outcome measures, etc., be predicated on evidence-based guidelines and nationally recognized best practices.

2015 House RC Vote #302 Sponsor: Rep. Roberts

HB 4604 - Erosion Permit Exceptions – Provides an exemption from erosion control permits for certain routine agricultural practices that do not cause soil erosion into lakes or streams.

| 2015 House RC Vote #141 Sponsor: Rep. Outman

HB 4166 - County Promo. Tax - Repeals a law that allows counties to circumvent voter approval for property tax hikes that involve trade expo, tourism promotion, etc. Counties could still levy the tax with voter approval.

2015 House RC Vote #407 Sponsor: Sen. Schmidt

SB 414 - Income Tax Reduction - Allows for a rollback of the personal income tax rate. If revenue in the general fund increases faster than inflation the rate could roll back, beginning in 2023.

2015 House RC Vote #405 Sponsor: Rep. McCready

HB 4738 - *Gas Tax Hike* - Increases the 19 cents per gallon gasoline tax and 15 cents per gallon diesel tax to 26.3 cents per gallon beginning in 2017.

2015 House RC Vote #406 Sponsor: Rep. McCready

HB 4736 - *Vehicle Reg Tax Hike* - Increases registration taxes on passenger vehicles and commercial trucks by 20 percent per vehicle, beginning in 2017. Creates a surcharge on electric and alternative fuel vehicles, which don't contribute to gasoline tax revenues.

2015 House RC Vote #459 Sponsor: Rep. Pscholka

HB 5105 - *HICA Tax* -Extends a 0.75% tax on health insurance claims for eight additional years, from 2017 to 2024.

2016 House RC Vote #395 Sponsor: Rep. Bumstead

HB 5457 - **Auto Ins. Tax Credit Repeal** - Repeals a tax credit for auto insurers that defrays their cost of complying with state mandated care for uninsured accident victims.

2015 House RC Vote #493 Sponsor: Sen. Brandenburg

SB 492 - NLRB "Push Back" - Establishes that franchisees are the sole employer of the workers for whom they provide a benefit plan or pay wages, except as specifically provided in the franchise agreement. This legislation "pushes back" against the Obama Administration's National Labor Relations Board ruling aimed at unionizing across individual franchises.

2015 House RC Vote #494 Sponsor: Sen. Proos

SB 493 - NLRB "Push Back" II - Establishes that for the purpose of workers compensation insurance coverage, the owner of a business franchise is considered the sole employer of the workers. This legislation "pushes back" against the Obama Administration's National Labor Relations Board ruling aimed at unionizing across individual franchises.

Note: Bills/Roll Call votes in green would expand economic freedom.

Those in red would decrease economic freedom.

KEY VOTE SENATE SUMMARIES

2015 Senate RC Vote #304 Sponsor: Rep. Lauwers HB 4122 - End Film Subsidies - Repeals Michigan's film subsidy program that gives tax dollars to film producers. More than \$500 million in film subsidies have been handed out since the program began in 2008.

2015 Senate RC Vote #311 Sponsor: Rep. Garcia HB 4226 - Expand Tech. Subsidies - Increases the number of areas in which "certified technology parks" are allowed to expand. These zones use tax increment financing to provide subsidies to technology-based businesses.

2015 Senate RC Vote #576 Sponsor: Sen. Booher SB 200 - Broker Subsidies - Authorizes subsidies from the Michigan Strategic Fund for investment brokers selling certain stock portfolios that include Michigan companies. Allows for subsidies up to \$1 million per qualified investor or investment market.

2016 Senate RC Vote #80 Sponsor: Rep. Runestad HB 4458 - Complete Streets - Eliminates a Spending government-mandated complete streets advisory council (oftentimes stacked with sidewalk interests) that was part of a 2010 law mandating local government master plans incorporate planning to accommodate pedestrians, So automobiles, bicycles, etc..

2015 Senate RC Vote #627 Sponsor: Sen. Schuitmaker SB 616 - Pyramid - Creates a tax carve-out from the state sales tax for business equipment purchases made by an Internet data center. While the carve out was originally aimed at one business, it was expanded as a carveout to businesses within this niche sector.

HB 4162 - End Lift Restrictions - Pares back requirements on residential lift installers, requiring certification and insurance in lieu of a burdensome licensing requirements placed on other elevator contractors. This bill would expand the number of contractors who can install residential chairlifts and platform lifts for the elderly and disabled.

2015 Senate RC Vote #161 Sponsor: Rep. Forlini HB 4038 - Eviction Notice by Email - Allows landords and tenants to negotiate leases that provide for eviction notices via email (the first of many steps toward eviction).

2016 Senate RC Vote #255 Sponsor: Sen. Stamas SB 853 - Pre-empt Plastic Bag Bans - Preempts local governments from creating regulations or restrictions on "auxiliary containers including plastic grocery bags. Ensures purchasing and selling decisions remain with consumers and businesses not local politicians.

2015 Senate RC Vote #296 Sponsor: Rep. Poleski **HB 4052** - **Preempt Wage Ordinances** - Prevents local governments (which derive their power from the state constitution) from imposing mandatory wage, benefit, leave time, and other requirements on employers that are more burdensome than those required by state or federal law.

2015 Senate RC Vote #382 Sponsor: Sen. Hansen SB 64 - Nursing Home Regs - Repeals some of the detailed regulations on nursing homes, instead requiring that patient care policies, outcome measures, etc., be predicated on evidence-based guidelines and nationally recognized best practices.

2015 Senate RC Vote #632 Sponsor: Rep. Roberts HB 4604 - Erosion Permit Exceptions - Provides an exemption from erosion control permits for certain routine agricultural practices that do not cause soil erosion into lakes or streams.

2015 Senate RC Vote #374 Sponsor: Rep. Outman HB 4166 - County Promo. Tax - Repeals a law that allows counties to circumvent voter approval for property tax hikes that involve trade expo, tourism promotion, etc. Counties could still levy the tax with voter approval.

2015 Senate RC Vote #479 Sponsor: Sen. Schmidt SB 414 - Income Tax Reduction - Allows for a rollback of the personal income tax rate. If revenue in the general fund increases faster than inflation the rate could roll back, beginning in 2023.

2015 Senate RC Vote #476 Sponsor: Rep. McCready HB 4738 - Gas Tax Hike - Increases the 19 cents per gallon gasoline tax and 15 cents per gallon diesel tax to 26.3 cents per gallon beginning in 2017.

2015 Senate RC Vote #475 Sponsor: Rep. McCready HB 4736 - Vehicle Reg Tax Hike - Increases registration taxes on passenger vehicles and commercial trucks by 20 percent per vehicle, beginning in 2017. Creates a surcharge on electric and alternative fuel vehicles, which don't contribute to gasoline tax revenues.

2016 Senate RC Vote #76 Sponsor: Rep. Pscholka HB 5105 - HICA Tax - Extends a 0.75% tax on health insurance claims for eight additional years, from 2017 to 2024.

2016 Senate RC Vote #382 Sponsor: Rep. Bumstead HB 5457 - Auto Ins. Tax Credit Repeal - Repeals a tax credit for auto insurers that defravs their cost of complying with state mandated care for uninsured accident victims.

2015 Senate RC Vote #173 Sponsor: Sen Robertson SB 3 - Prevailing Wage Law Repeal - Repeals the state prevailing wage law for state financed or sponsored construction projects, which prohibits awarding contract to the lowest bidder unless that bidder pays wages based on union pay scales that tend to be above the market rate.

2015 Senate RC Vote #391 Sponsor: Sen. Hood SB 500 - Unemployment Hike - An amendment offered by Sen. Hood that would tie-bar SB 500 to SB 525. SB 525 would raise unemployment benefits.

2016 Senate RC Vote #124 Sponsor: Sen. Hansen SB 710 - Detroit Public School Bailout - Part of a broader bailout package totaling more than \$700 million, this legislation ends emergency management of Detroit Public Schools and gives an Education Commission appointed by the Detroit Mayor the power to ration school options for Detroit school parents.

2015 Senate RC Vote #510 Sponsor: Sen. Brandenburg SB 492 - NLRB "Push Back" - Establishes that franchisees are the sole employer of the workers for whom they provide a benefit plan or pay wages, except as specifically provided in the franchise agreement. This legislation "pushes back" against the Obama Administration's National Labor Relations Board ruling aimed at unionizing across individual franchises.

2015 Senate RC Vote #511 Sponsor: Sen. Proos SB 493 - NLRB "Push Back" II - Establishes that for the purpose of workers compensation insurance coverage, the owner of a business franchise is considered the sole employer of the workers. This legislation "pushes back" against the Obama Administration's National Labor Relations Board ruling aimed at unionizing across individual franchises.

2015 Senate RC Vote #507 Sponsor: Sen. Knollenberg SB 280 - Ban Government Pay for Union Work -Prohibits government employers, including public schools, from including employer-paid union release time (time spent conducting union business) from employment contracts. It is inappropriate for taxpayers to compensate employees for time that is not spent working for them.

2015 Senate RC Vote #561 Sponsor: Sen. Robertson SB 638 - Campaign Finance - More clearly defines what constitutes an "independent expenditure" and ensures opportunities for free political speech consistent with the Supreme Court's Citizens United case.
