EXPLAINING THE PROCESS

Every year, AFP-WV releases an updated version of our Path to Prosperity Legislative Agenda. The Path to Prosperity is a comprehensive policy agenda that is meant to act as a roadmap for policymakers. It embodies the bottom up solutions that will change the state's status quo and help our fellow Mountaineers reach their full potential. Launched in 2019, the policy agenda seeks to elevate and amplify voices of West Virginians across the state who want to remove the barriers that are holding them back.

We work with legislative leaders of both parties to enact the much-needed reforms we outline in the Path to Prosperity.

When one of these policies is up for a vote in committee or on the floor, we send a Key Vote Alert to every member of the legislature indicating our support for the bill being decided upon. In some instances, we ask lawmakers to vote against legislation that will be detrimental to creating the conditions for a new and stronger West Virginia in which everyone can reach their full potential.

We advocate for policies during the session through the use of our Key Vote Alerts and by connecting citizens with their lawmakers on the issues at hand. We monitor how lawmakers vote, and we use our annual scorecard to let folks know how their elected officials voted on some of the most critical issues from each legislative session. This helps to increase government transparency, get citizens engaged in the legislative process, and to inform lawmakers on the issues.

Criminal Justice Reform

SEIZURE AND FORFEITURE REPORTING ACT | HB 4717

House RCS# 363, RCS# 719 | Senate RCS# 513

Under current law, if law enforcement believes that a persons' property is in some way related to a crime, they're able to seize and permanently take ownership of that individual's property even if that person was never convicted of, or even charged with, a crime. House Bill 4717 establishes common-sense reporting requirements to shed needed light on West Virginia's concerning practice of civil asset forfeiture. Current forfeiture procedures easily endanger the property and due process rights of Mountaineers and poses too much of a potential conflict of interest for seizing agencies not to be well-documented through robust reporting requirements.

HB 4717 creates a central, publicly available database of forfeitures, providing much-needed data on individual seizures and details such as the alleged offenses connected to forfeitures, whether owners were charged or convicted of any crimes, and how proceeds from forfeiture were spent. Before HB 4717, West Virginians knew none of this information, which should be publicly available as a common-sense, good government measure.

BAIL REFORM | HB 2419

There are thousands of West Virginians who are currently in jail before their trial not because they are a risk of flight or a danger to public safety, but due to the fact that they can't afford bail. Making bail is a huge financial barrier for many low-income families. People stuck in jail for financial reasons, for even as little as two or three days before trial, can cause people to lose their jobs, have their worlds turned upside down, and be at greater risk for recidivism—resulting in higher costs to taxpayers.

If someone isn't a threat to society, we shouldn't ruin their life just because they don't have a lot of money. HB 2419 addresses this issue by ensuring individuals who are not dangerous are released on their own recognizance, foregoing the need for bail. The bill simply creates a presumption that for those accused of lower-level, non-violent misdemeanors, judges should release them without financial conditions. This presumption can always be overridden by the judge for good cause shown, striking a balance between limiting unnecessary consequences of being held in jail prior to trial and giving judges necessary discretion.

PAROLE REFORM | SB 620

Senate Bill 620 allows the Commissioner of Corrections to establish a non-violent offense parole program that helps accelerate eligible, low-risk incarcerated individuals' access to parole, prioritizing limited space in West Virginia's overcrowded correctional facilities for those accused of more serious offenses.

SB 620 allows individuals convicted of non-violent offenses who have successfully completed a rehabilitation treatment program to be paroled without requiring action from the Parole Board, as long as they have already served their minimum term of their sentence, and are already eligible for parole under the pre-existing, slower process. While this is a positive step in the right direction, further reforms are needed to West Virginia's parole system.

ENDING SUSPENSION OF DRIVER'S LICENSES FOR FAILURE TO PAY FINES & FEES | HB 4958

House Bill 4958 ends West Virginia's misguided practice of suspending driver's licenses over unpaid court fines and fees, part of a flawed system that impacts over 11 million Americans.

Before the passage of HB 4958, when West Virginians couldn't pay their court fines and fees, our state suspended their driver's licenses. This policy disproportionately affected lower-income Mountaineers, forcing too many to choose between losing their jobs by not driving to work or risking jail time and more fines for driving with a suspended license. Court fines and fees should eventually be paid, but revoking a person's ability to drive hampers their ability to earn money to pay these fines and to provide for their families.

West Virginia's sentencing laws desperately need a thorough review to ensure fairness, uniformity, and to ensure tax dollars are being appropriately spent to maximize public safety and successful outcomes from our criminal justice system.

HB 4004 will create the West Virginia Sentencing Commission, which will be tasked to research and make recommendations to current sentencing guidelines and statutes. This is a critical step to provide lawmakers and other stakeholders the necessary information to right-size our criminal justice system and be smarter about how we spend corrections' dollars.

EXPUNGING CERTAIN CRIMINAL CONVICTIONS | SB 562

SB 562 doubles down on last year's Second Chance for Employment Act, which gives the chance for a clean slate to more West Virginians who have turned their lives around since serving their sentences. This



legislation streamlines current expungement laws to remove wasteful and unnecessary red tape, allowing more deserving West Virginians a second chance at successful reentry.

REMOVING THE USE OF POST-CRIMINAL CONDUCT IN PROFESSIONAL AND OCCUPATIONAL INITIAL LICENSURE OR CERTIFICATION IN DECISION MAKING | HB 4352

House Bills 4352 and 4353 are similar to legislation our state passed in 2019 that removed unreasonable barriers to occupational licensing for those with criminal

records, such as prohibiting licensure for those who were found to have committed crimes of moral turpitude or other vague and overly broad language.

The bills require occupational boards to more fairly decide whether to revoke someone's license based on criminal history.

CREATING A RATIONAL NEXUS REQUIREMENT BETWEEN PRIOR CRIMINAL CONDUCT AND INITIAL LICENSURE DECISION MAKING| HB 4353

Too often, jobs carry onerous licensing requirements that excludes anyone with a prior criminal conviction. These restrictions provide no increase in public safety and just serve to reduce competition while denying individuals trying to successfully reenter society an opportunity to support themselves and their families.

HB 4353 removes many blanket exclusions to occupational licenses simply due to a past criminal record and require the agency to examine the individual and determine whether there is a "rational nexus" between the criminal history and the license sought. This strikes a good balance between getting more West Virginians to work while protecting the safety and integrity of the various licensed professions.

Economic Opportunity

ESTABLISHING THE OFFICE OF REGULATORY AND FISCAL AFFAIRS UNDER THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON GOVERNMENT AND FINANCE| HB 4645

HB 4645—which had bipartisan support—would have improved government quality and good stewardship of taxpayer dollars by helping lawmakers examine the fiscal impacts of proposed legislation and the economic impacts of new and old regulations with a fiscal or economic impact greater than \$1 million.

Conducting independent analysis along with the generation of accurate fiscal notes before making decisions about legislation and regulations would have ensured that decisions are accurately informed, and any potential consequences are properly considered.

HB 4645 represented responsible public policy that will help remove barriers to economic opportunities and opens the doors for all West Virginians to succeed.

While the legislature did not complete action, the Joint Committee on Government and Finance is nevertheless creating the entity to carry out the vision that the legislation sought to bring to fruition.

CHB 4892 would have created a fund dedicated to reducing West Virginian's personal income tax burden that, in the long term, would have helped create jobs, grow our state's gross domestic product and help all West Virginians prosper.

Reimagining Health Care

TELEHEALTH EXPANSION (AND THE DEFEAT OF PAYMENT PARITY PRICE FIXING) | HB 4003

Telemedicine describes telecommunication technologies health care providers offer to remotely diagnose, treat, and monitor patients around the country. HB 4003 ensures that families, especially individuals that reside in

underserved rural communities, can access health care in a timely manner when medical providers are not readily available by expanding the availability of telemedicine.

AFP was instrumental in working with principled lawmakers to thwart an attempt by Big Medical special interests to use this bill as vehicle to make telehealth more expensive for consumers by fixing prices via government mandates called payment parity.

Free Speech

CREATING THE PROTECT OUR RIGHT TO UNITE ACT | SB 16

SB 16 protects citizens' First Amendment rights by precluding government entities from requiring the information of individuals who support nonprofit entities to be disclosed.

The narrow intent of this legislation is to prevent potentially politically motivated bureaucracies from broadcasting nonprofit donor information, which often results in the intimidation or harassment of individuals due to their support for their preferred passions.

CREATING THE INTERMEDIATE COURT OF APPEALS | SB 275

A well-functioning judiciary ensures that every citizen receives equal justice under the law. Our current judicial system fails at this due to a lack of sufficient conclusiveness in appellate review. West Virginians deserve a compete justice system that is predictable, fair, and conclusive.

This new appellate court will provide much needed accountability and balance within our judicial branch of government. Unfortunately, a modern court system will remain out of reach for the Mountain State due to this legislation being rejected by the House of Delegates.

CREATING THE INTERMEDIATE COURT OF APPEALS, HOUSE FLOOR AMENDMENT DELEGATE ZUCKOFF | SB 275

This amendment added child abuse and neglect cases to the purview of the new court. While proponents of this amendment purported that their support was based on a desire to help children, a closer look at their

votes shows a very different intent. Many of the same members who voted to include this provision also voted against the final passage of the bill. In short, members who voted for this amendment and against the bill's final passage were, sadly, just playing politics with our judicial system.
