METHODOLOGY**

Scores on the AFP-AZ Scorecard are calculated using the following formula:

**FOR BILLS AFP SUPPORTED:**

**AYE Vote** = 1 Points  
**NAY Vote** = 0 Point

*Non votes and absences were not calculated for or against the member’s score, as there is not a method for assuming intent or extenuating circumstances.*

**FOR BILLS AFP OPPOSED:**

**AYE Vote** = 0 Points  
**NAY Vote** = 1 Point

**GRADES ARE ASSIGNED ACCORDING TO THE  
FOLLOWING SCALE:**

**A+** = 100%  
**A** = 90-99%  
**B** = 80-89%  
**C** = 70-79%  
**D** = 60-69%

# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## CRIMINAL JUSTICE REFORM

### HB 2067 | CERTIFICATE OF REHABILITATION

In cases in which a court sets aside a judgment of guilt, the court is allowed or required (depending on the offense) to issue a Certificate of Second Chance. The certificate will greatly contribute to giving a person a second chance and decrease recidivism by providing relief for occupational license restriction based on criminal history, and protections to an employer/housing manager who hires the person.

### HB 2166 | DATA TRANSPARENCY

Creates a reportable survey of criminal justice agencies’ data from state and local departments. Reliable and consistent data critical for lawmakers making smart criminal justice policy that keeps society safe and government more efficient.



### HB 2318 | HANNAH PRIORS SENTENCING

To be charged as a “repeat offender,” a person needs to commit a crime, be convicted, and later commit another crime. Too often, the Arizona justice system punishes a person due to stacking of offenses that were committed on the same occasion to enhance the penalty as if they were a “repeat offender.” This reform ends this practice and requires a previous conviction to enhance penalties as a “repeat offender.”

### HB 2787 | MORAL CHARACTER OL REFORM

Establishes clearer and more well-defined guidelines for occupational licensing boards considering criminal history when reviewing an occupational license application such as 1) defining which crimes are always grounds for denial; 2) requiring other offenses to specifically and directly relate to the occupation; and 3) disallowing use of non-conviction records, juvenile records, and non-violent misdemeanor convictions.

### HB 2810 | CIVIL ASSET FORFEITURE

Requires a person to be criminally convicted before their property is subject to forfeiture and creates a process for a person to retrieve their property.

### SB 1849 | DIGNITY FOR INCARCERATED WOMEN

Addresses needs of incarcerated women in Arizona by equipping the Arizona Department of Corrections with the framework to handle gender-specific issues, including hygiene products, proximity to their minor children, inspections during state of undress, and treatment of pregnant women including a significant restriction on “shackling” while pregnant/giving labor. This reform ensures women in Arizona’s prison system are rendered basic human dignity.

### HB 2162 | UNDESIGNATED FELONY

This allows for someone charged with the lowest level of felony to receive a misdemeanor after they successfully complete the terms of their supervision. This incentivizes an individual to successfully reintegrate into society and provide a real second chance.

### HB 2167 | CORRECTIONS OMBUDSMAN

Establishes an ombudsman position over the Arizona Department of Corrections, promoting criminal justice oversight and transparency. The position holder will report findings to legislators and increase public awareness to have more accountability within the criminal justice system.

### SB 1551 | DRIVER’S LICENSE SUSPENSIONS

This bill ends the practice of suspending or restricting a driver’s license simply because the person could not pay the fine associated with a traffic violation. Additionally, it allows the court to waive fines if the person can prove payment would cause financial

hardship. This will allow people to continue to use their vehicle to drive to work and pay off their financial obligations without affecting public safety.

### SB 1064 / HB 2713 | EARNED RELEASE CREDITS

Expands the release credits an incarcerated person can earn for those serving time for non-violent offenses if they maintain good behavior and participate in recidivism-reducing programming while incarcerated. This is a large step in encouraging rehabilitation programs, reducing recidivism, and using taxpayer dollars wisely while keeping public safety a priority.





# BILL DESCRIPTIONS

## HEALTH CARE

### SB 1048 | HEALTH CARE MINISTRIES

Maintains a level playing field for health care sharing ministries to exist and operate. This allows Arizonans to have more control over their care and promotes free market solutions.

### HB 2454 | TELEHEALTH

Comprehensive telehealth expansion improves access and provides Arizonans with more control over their health care, particularly those in rural communities without easy access to providers and elderly communities that might be more at risk.



## EDUCATION

### HB 2898 | K-12 EDUCATION—BUDGET

Includes two K-12 education policies;  
1) Transportation microgrants for families utilizing public school options but are unable to fully exercise choice because of a lack of transportation, and  
2) Reforming open enrollment to make it a more transparent process that highlights a lottery system for schools that are allowing open enrollment.

### SB 1400 | LEARN EVERYWHERE

This policy would require public schools to allow students in grades 9-12 to receive one elective credit per school year for extracurriculars, to acknowledge and promote learning that happens outside the classroom.

## EMPLOYMENT

### SB 1218 | SUNRISE/SUNSET OCCUPATIONAL LICENSURE

Creates substantive sunrise and sunset review practices in the nation in which Committees of References must consider alternatives to licensure for non-health professions, resulting in a decrease of burdensome licensing regulations.

## REGULATIONS

### SB 1377 | CIVIL LIABILITY DURING PUBLIC HEALTH PANDEMIC

Waives liability for those acting in good faith to protect the health of others during a public health emergency, encouraging businesses to stay in operation during a pandemic.

### HB 2773 | TO-GO ALCOHOL

Allows establishments with beer and wine and liquor licenses to sell alcohol intended for off-premises consumption. During the COVID-19 pandemic, removing restrictions on businesses to sell to-go alcohol allowed businesses to stay afloat in a time they would typically close their doors. Codifying this regulatory reform will continue to let businesses provide services to meet consumer demand.

### HB 2248 | CORPORATION COMMISSION ENERGY

Requires the Arizona Corporation Commission to adopt rules to ensure the ratepayers are protected by having access to the lowest energy costs. The law pulls back the ACC clean energy mandates and establishes much more incremental clean energy requirements for retail kilowatt sales.

## TAX AND SPENDING

### SB 1828 / HB 2900 | TAXATION

This bill reduces the personal income tax rate from a progressive rate to a flat rate of 2.5% for all Arizonans.



### SB 1827 / HB 2899 | TAXATION

After Proposition 208 passed in the 2020 general election, income tax rates rose to 8 percent for many Arizona families. As a direct result of this tax hike, many Arizonans and small businesses fled the state for better economic opportunities. This bill creates an aggregate individual income tax rate cap of 4.5 percent.

## TECHNOLOGY & INNOVATION

### HB 2711 | RURAL BROADBAND

Expands broadband and removes barriers to internet access for those with fewer opportunities to get high speed internet. Protects Arizonans' property rights and secures Arizona as a leader on internet connectivity.

### H.B. 2813 | AUTONOMOUS VEHICLES

Allows Arizona to stay a leader in technology and innovation by advancing the development of driverless vehicles with a light-handed approach to regulation and a focus on public safety.
